What are the SATs?

SATs tests are compulsory national tests for primary school pupils.

Children in England are required to take **Standard Assessment Tests** (SATs) at the age of 11 (school year 6) and do so on the same days throughout the country

SATs measure how children achieve against the National Standard. They also assess the progress they have made during their time at school in comparison to other children across England.

When are the SATs?

Key stage 2

The key stage 2 tests are timetabled from Monday 8 May to Thursday 11 May 2017.

There is no science sampling for the 2016 to 2017 academic year.

Monday 8th – Reading Comprehension

Pupils will have a total of 1 hour to read the 3 texts in the reading booklet and complete the 36 questions at their own pace.

They can approach the test as they choose, but the best way is usually working through one text and answering the questions before moving on to the next.

The least-demanding text will come first, with the following texts increasing in level of difficulty.

The Grammar and Punctuation part of the test involves one paper with 49 questions. Pupils have 45 minutes to complete this.





Wednesday 10th– Maths Papers 1&2

- Maths Paper 2 is a Reasoning test which pupils have 40 minutes to complete






A bag of 5 lemons costs £1

Writing

Writing isn't assessed through a test but is judged across the year
